

Good Friday 18 April


12 noon Meditation at the Cross: an hour's service to reflect on the cross, its cost and meaning.

Easter Sunday 20 April


10 am - Celebrate the joy of the resurrection and the freedom it offers us today; Holy Communion. And an Easter Egg hunt for children!

Maundy Thursday





On Maundy Thursday we remember particularly the Last Supper in an "upper room" in Jerusalem when Jesus set the tone by washing his disciples' feet before having the meal which has been the foundation stone of the Christian Eucharist for nearly 2,000 years. Here at St Anne's, we share a meal ,with Holy Communion included, as we remember that occasion. It is of course the inspiration for a vast range of artworks of which da Vinci's Last Supper is merely the best known. Here are some more, from the reverential to the light hearted.

The arrival of spring has brought wonderful colour to the garden. The snowdrops and crocus, which were a delight two months ago, are now resting again rebuilding their strength for next year. The daffodils, large and small, are rampant at the time of writing.


Purple grape hyacinths and the larger blue, pink, and white varieties are in splendid array. The camelia bush is covered in colourful large pink flowers, and on the first

official day of spring I was astonished to find two pink tulips opening up in a sheltered sunny corner.

The sheer amount of energy being used to grow these plants emphasises the wonder of nature around us.

The pear tree is in full bud now although the small apple tree looks as though it has had a bad winter. Hydrangeas are leafing up after being dead headed but, dare I say it, could do with some rain!

So what of our feathered friends? The birds are singing, and pairs of great tits and blue tits dash in and out to grab bits of peanuts. Mr and Mrs Robin are looking splendidly cheery and must be feeding some little ones nearby in what appears to be a full time job. Watching magpies trying to feed on peanut feeders is entertaining, with lots of wing flapping, and the pigeons vie for feeding space. The grass under the nuts has been walked on by so many large footed birds that it developed


It has otherwise been a quiet month when looking out of the window, with an occasional bumble bee cruising round enjoying some lovely sunny days.

Growth, and more growth – what for?

"Growth" is the driving priority of our present government, and also maybe for the Church of England with its investment in programs to create large numbers of new worshipping communities. But what do we want to grow and what is it for?

The government (and it's not unique to the current government) sees growth as the only way to generate the resources needed to fund our ailing and underfunded public sector. The alternatives of higher taxation and redistribution are seen as beyond the pale.

But if this growth is just about us – some of us anyway – having lots more "stuff", if it means continuing to plunder the environment and if the proceeds are simply to be pocketed by the already rich, should we want it?

Just as I was contemplating writing on the subject, Rowan Williams (last Archbishop of Canterbury but one) wrote a brilliant piece on this for the

of what he said for my own ramblings, he says it so much better.

He began by speaking of the Covid epidemic and amid the challenges, loss and bewilderment, when normal activity was on hold we experienced, "Clearer skies, silent roads, time, a sense of what mattered and who mattered, to us as individuals and to the whole of society." But "our capacity for not learning from crisis is impressively well developed. We are back where we were, our fingers firmly in our ears, with the supercharged language of "growth" as the all sufficient goal of national life.... We are fed a narrative in which growth is something that needs no justification." What do we want? Simply... "More!"

What makes for a stable. successful, confident society? "Secure work and fulfilling leisure... dependable public services and affordable housing, a durable trustworthy

Guardian so I'll substitute some environment.... breathing space. Growth should mean growing the capacity to sustain all this. But isolate growth from public good and you are simply planning for breakdown."

> "The uncomfortable truth is that in our present global context, growth frequently means the opposite of shared responsibility." Can we find signs of hope? Can we show that the characteristics of a healthy society are not a Utopian fantasy? Do read Archbishop Rowan's article if you can find it online.

And what might this say to us about the Church's pursuit of growth? Some of the recent activity is very much focused on numerical and financial growth (and yes we certainly need it) but is that how we measure growth and not also in faith, in commitment and service?

We often risk a current priority becoming a dogma. Don't be afraid to challenge this sort of thing!

The most generous givers?

Stewardship, in its 2025 Generosity Report says that those who attend church and read their Bible at least once a week are the most generous givers... Stewardship manages charitable donations from church, charities and individuals, and has found that not only do 'committed Christians' give away almost five times the UK monthly average, but they experience "the most joy" from doing so.

Stewardship's recent survey found that 'Committed Christians' give an average of 11.6 per cent of monthly income, 'Practising Christians' give 7.99 per cent, 'Churchgoing Christians' give 5.30 percent, and 'Cultural Christians' give 0.84 per cent.
