# Happy 1700<sup>th</sup> Birthday, Nicene Creed!

This month, 1700 years ago, one of the most important meetings in the history of the Christian Church began in the Bithynian city of Nicaea. It began in May 325 and went on until the end of July 325.

The Council of Nicaea was convened by the Roman Emperor Constantine, and he had an urgent job for the Christian bishops to do. He wanted them to spell out as exactly as they could the core beliefs of the Christian Church, especially with regard to the person of Christ.

Constantine had good reason to do this: a man called Arius of Alexandria was spreading the idea that Jesus Christ was not divine, but instead was a created being. Such a belief, if accepted, would have changed the very heart of Christianity.

After three months of hard work, the bishops at Nicaea had prayerfully and carefully written down as exactly as they could the core beliefs of Christianity. It became known as the Nicene Creed, and it has been the bedrock of orthodox Christianity ever since.

The Nicene Creed is unique in that is the only Christian statement of faith that is accepted as authoritative by the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and major Protestant Churches.

The Kerria, Forsythia and Pieris bushes add their own varying colours to the view from the window, and the startling tangerine of the Azalea by the front gate and pale pink of the Rhododendron by the back door will be in full display soon.

The big Japanese Maple or Acer tree is now covered in large bronze leaves. Those of its smaller relative nearby are much more delicate and finely divided. Next door to us the flowering cherry is

spreading its pale pink blossom all over our back lawn in the breezy conditions, and our apple and pear trees are laden with blossom. Maybe we will harvest more than one piece of eatable fruit from each tree this year! The rhubarb is thriving and we enjoy the crumbles as a result.

I have not mentioned any birds as yet, and peanuts between them every week. They are a constant source of noisy interest. Two large black crows have become regulars at the bird bath in the warm weather and they keep me fit in keeping the water level up as I trek backwards and forwards.

### Wild Worship: Encountering God in Creation

Over the past few months, our *Wild Worship* gatherings have taken us outdoors to discover God in the beauty of His creation. These special times have reminded us that God made the world and asks us to take care of it. As we explore nature together, we've found simple, joyful ways to learn about God's love and celebrate Him through the world He made.

On St David's Day, we remembered the Welsh saint by recreating the hill he is said to have raised while preaching. Using sticks and natural materials, we built a small hill and made stick people to represent St David and the crowd who listened to him. Inspired by his wellknown words, "Do the little things," we each found a small treasure from nature like a feather, a stone, or a flower—and placed it on a log as a gift to God. As we did, we shared one small thing we wanted to do to help care for the earth, showing how even little actions can make a big

difference.

For Mothering Sunday, we focused on care and kindness in the natural world. As we gently lifted logs, we found mother woodlice looking after their babies—learning that the babies stay on their mother's body until they are ready to explore safely. We were amazed by this tiny glimpse of God's caring design. We helped birds by making bird feeders and planted sunflower seeds, saying thank-you prayers as we placed each one in the soil. We also gave thanks for our mums and carers, and for

God's loving care for all of us.

#### Meet Aurelia

'Climate change has been killing our crops, and this is our food.' An inspirational farmer and community leader, Aurelia and her family belong to the Indigenous Q'eqchi' community of the Alta Verapaz region.

The climate crisis and industrial plantations have changed Q'eqchi' land dramatically. Gruelling heatwaves, savage storms and unpredictable seasons are ravaging farms. Industrial agriculture is taking over the last of the region's natural resources to feed the world's richest countries. Many of the vital crops that Aurelia depends on are withering and dying before her eyes.

#### **Meet Amelia**

'With high heat, there is little we can do but adapt.'

Amelia is a resourceful and determined 24-year-old farmer who lives with her husband and their two children, from the Indigenous Q'eqchi' community of the Alta Verapaz region.

As the river runs dry and water becomes scarce, the vital crops that Amelia depends on wither and die before her eyes. It's a heartbreaking injustice, when no more than a mile away, industrial plantations are taking the last of the region's natural resources to feed the world's richest countries.

## Maybe there's hope...

It's all so depressing! And as they say, "If you're not angry, you're not paying attention". "Wild, bright hope" (the title of our Lent book) may be a bit difficult in the international and political scene at the moment but yes, we can hope.

"The folk tradition can often supply you with the song you are struggling to write...." And so to the Waterside to see and hear Martin Simpson, internationally preeminent in his sphere but £19 - none of this £250 for a seat in a stadium stuff — and even the chance to have a few words with him in the interval.

He sang Deportee, about the mistreatment and heartless removal of immigrants across the Mexican border with the chorus line: "All they will call you will be 'deportees'". And it sounded very current, a howl of protest about some of what is going on across the Atlantic. But it turned out to be a Woody Guthrie song about an incident in 1948.

In 1950 Woody Guthrie rented

a property at Beach Haven from a landlord he found to be profiteering and racist and it led to his 1954 song: *Old Man Trump*: "Beach Haven is Trump's Tower where no Black folks come to roam," and his landlord was Fred Trump, father of the current president of the USA.

So it feels like we've been here before. That time (and it was the era of McCarthyism paranoia too) passed and the USA settled into the more relaxed and progressive country we came to expect. Naturally it had its bad side, where doesn't, but it should give us hope that the present experience will pass into history and better times will come. Better times coming are little consolation to those suffering in the meantime but hope helps us through. Let's hope....



# **Parish Share**

What it means for you and your church



#### What is Parish Share?

Parish Share is the amount of money that your parish is asked to contribute to pay for mission and ministry, specifically for clergy stipends and their housing. This leaflet explains how the costs of mission and ministry are worked out and what those costs are for 2025.

The Parish Share that you are asked to pay is calculated using a formula which considers whether your clergy are full time or part time and where your parish is situated socio-economically using the 2021 census information. It also takes into account our shared responsibility to support parishes in areas of deprivation. There's more information about how this is calculated in the Parish Share section of the Chester Diocese website.

# Where does the money go?

The ministry and mission of The Church of England is largely funded through the incredible generosity of those who give through their own parish church. The cash donations in the offertory and the regular payments that you make through your bank account impact the financial health and the mission of your own parish church and are also closely linked to those of Chester Diocese.




# Where does the money come from?
