Fair Trade Sunday

Taizé-tastic

When the opportunity came, we grabbed it with both hands. A week-long stay in Taizé, to worship with the 80 or so brothers who live there and the thousands of visitors who travel there weekly, to live in community.

Taizé is a fairly large village in the Burgundy region of France. Simplicity was the word of the week – everything was just enough and not more. We sat on wooden benches, learnt to dine using only a spoon, shared a dorm with five others and became experts at queuing. Worldly things aside, the



worship was simply spirit filling. How encouraging to see 2,000 people, mostly young, pouring into the Taizé church three times a day to worship Jesus.

All worship is sung, and in every single language. We sang in Romanian, Chinese, German, Portuguese, Italian, French and many more languages and heard prayers sung in Arabic, Bengali and Thai to name a few. This multi-national, ecumenical worship was truly inclusive. Worshipping with our brothers and sisters in Christ from every nation under the sun was simply

magical and a powerful reminder that Jesus came to die for every single one of us around the globe. During the worship, silence is held for ten minutes, a unique experience for most, to allow room to hear from the Almighty.

That video clip we often see in church during communion of the Taizé altar with the candles, really does look like that!

We're working up a talk about our trip to Taizé and hope to share much more of what we



encountered in this thin place of the earth. We hope you'll want to join us when we schedule it.

Jerusalem

When we celebrated St Anne's day, our patronal festival, we sang "Jerusalem". Words by William Blake, music by Sir Hubert Parry. Who doesn't love it? It's a sort of unofficial English (as opposed to British/UK) national anthem.

Well, I've sometimes had my doubts. It conjures up stereotypical views of Women's Institutes, country women of a certain age and class – "Jam and Jerusalem" – and young hooray Henrys waving their little Union Jacks at the last night of the proms. A song for those whose England is indeed a green and pleasant land, for those who don't live amid those dark satanic mills. It can sound complacent, or, with its

admittedly metaphorical military references, triumphalist.

But look again. It's about struggle. About creating something wonderful in place of what is described as dark, satanic. My feelings about it were transformed by a young Jamaican poet – Michael Smith (I won't pretend to know what a dub poet is). He was a left wing critic of much in Jamaica and the UK, with poems of rage like "Mi cyaan believe it", and was murdered, apparently by political opponents, at the age of 28. My album of his poems includes him reciting Jerusalem, fizzing and spitting with passion. Here we really hear of and feel the unceasing fight to build something better.



All sorts of things that we enjoy become familiar; it's good to come at them from a fresh angle, and with hymns, anthems and

IMMERSION IN LIVING WATER

Ezekiel 47:9, 12

Living Water Season of Creation 2026

“Creationtide” has entered our vocabulary. The Church of England along with Roman Catholics, Orthodox and other denominations now celebrates the “Season of Creation”. It begins on 1 September – the start of the Orthodox church year- and runs until St Francis’ Day, 4 October. Churches and congregations are called to pay special attention to the responsibility of humanity for the Earth and for all that lives upon it.

This year’s theme is Living Water, reflecting this passage from Ezekiel: “Swarms of living creatures will live wherever the river flows. There will be large numbers of fish, because this water flows there and makes the salt water fresh; so where the river flows everything

grow on both banks of the river. Their leaves will not wither, nor will their fruit fail. Every month they will bear fruit, because the water from the sanctuary flows to them. Their fruit will serve for food and their leaves for healing.” (Ezek 47:9,12)

The theme, offers a powerful biblical vision of hope and ecological healing. Set amid exile and loss, the image of living water flowing from God’s sanctuary reveals divine healing that renews land, water, biodiversity, and human responsibility towards the whole creation.

The symbol depicts water flowing from the Temple of God - at first a tiny stream that grows deeper, and deeper and as it does so, it brings life to dead areas and restores

fertility to damaged or barren ecosystems. Through living water comes healing; but in order to receive new life, we too must step into the water and also become part of God’s river of life, taking part in the healing of creation.

I think the best bird story this month is about when I was parked at a red light at the Stretford motorway junction one day. A magpie landed on the pavement at the edge of a pedestrian



crossing. It waited a moment and the light went green and then it set off walking and hopping along the crossing to the other side. It was either

very knowledgeable or a coincidence but the situation made me chuckle whilst looking out of the window.

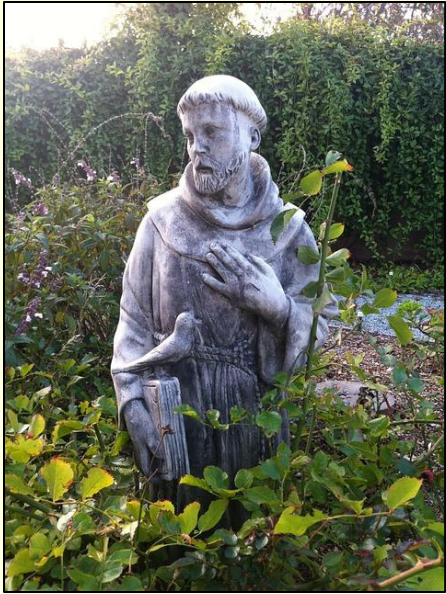
Saturday 19 September

St Francis



4 October is the feast of St Francis of Assisi. We know about his life and influence in his native Italy, about his love for animals and preaching to the birds, and about the Franciscan order. But remarkably, in 1219 he also travelled to the Holy Land and beyond, visiting Bethlehem before crossing enemy lines in Egypt to visit the Sultan, Malik-al-Kamil (nephew of the famous Saladin), preaching the Christian faith to him. Returning from the land

where he had stood in places sanctified by Christ's earthly presence, he recognised that most Christians would never make such a pilgrimage. And so, he gave us the Christmas crib!

On a cold Christmas Eve in 1223, in a cave near the small Italian town of Greccio, Francis created not merely a commemorative tableau or artistic representation, but a living, breathing recreation of the Nativity that allowed ordinary people to encounter the mystery of the Incarnation. The common people of medieval Italy — peasants, labourers, and townsfolk — heard the Gospel proclaimed in Latin they couldn't understand, in churches filled with images and rituals that often seemed distant from their daily lives. Francis sought to bridge this gap. Working with a local nobleman, he prepared a cave in the hillside. He brought a real ox and donkey and arranged hay in a manger. On Christmas Eve, the local community gathered by

torchlight. Mass was celebrated at the manger, with Francis himself serving as deacon and preaching about the humble birth of Christ.

For Francis, the central mystery of Christianity was that God did not remain distant and transcendent but entered fully into the material world, taking on human flesh with all its vulnerability and limitation. By recreating the Nativity with real elements — living animals, actual straw, the smell of the

stable, Francis was making a theological statement: the physical world matters to God. Matter is not something to be transcended or escaped but the very vehicle of divine presence. Now we have Christmas cribs in churches, on mantelpieces and widow ledges and on countless Christmas cards (sorry if this is the first mention of Christmas, too soon!). Let's not forget what it's all about!
